DA Says "Rights Violated"

"I'm just sick of it," Vic Feazell, District Attorney, said in the halls of the McLennan County Courthouse Monday.

Asked if he would consent to an interview, he said "no" but then said, "I guess you want to ask me about Kelly?"

"I have never seen or heard of the man," Feazell said.

He was referring to an investigation the Waco Police Department, Department of Public Safety and the Internal Revenue Service are reportedly doing on him when he said, "I'm sick of it."

"According to my time table this investigation, if there is one, began in April but according to their version, it began last December," Feazell said.

"I wish they would go on and do something," the DA said. "Then I will sue them, Roy Boyter, Jan Patterson and Larry Scott."

Boyter is an investigating officer with the DPS, Ms. Patterson is an assistant U.S. Attorney, and Scott is Chief of the Waco Police.

"An indictment would prove my innocence," Feazell continued. "They are just investigating me to try to find out something, but they can't because I am the cleanest politician there is."

"I'm too clean," he continued.

Feazell said he has been tailed, his house has been bugged, his phones tapped, his dog poisoned and his trash stolen.

"I am going to ask the justice

department to investigate the way my civil rights have been violated," Feazell stated.

The reference to Kelly, Clyde Kelly, Jr., a Waco burglary suspect, was in relation to his (Kelly) being taken into federal custody Nov. 15. His whereabouts remains a mystery.

His attorney, Rod Goble, confirmed last week that Kelly is being questioned about "gun charges."

Kelly was being held in McLennan County Jail on three separate burglary charges.

An Austin federal grand jury is reportedly looking into charges against Feazell, but no one will confirm there is a grand jury investigation.

About ten days ago, several Waco attorneys were supposed to testify before the grand jury, but no confirmation of subpoenas could be obtained.

Waco Attorney Charles McDonald said he had been questioned about three break-ins at his office on Waco Drive. McDonald later said jewelry was taken but other valuables were left. Briefcases were opened and files searched, McDonald said.

The attorney declined to say who had questioned him about the break-ins.

Scott had no comment when contacted Monday and Ms. Patterson was taking pleas in Waco's federal court Monday. Boyter could not be reached.
